

MEMORIAL TO DEAD STUDENT WARRIORS

Monument Will Be Dedicated at Catholic University by Alumni on June 14.

NEW LAW SCHOOL DEAN

Injured Student Recovering—Plans for Rector's Prize Debate—Dramatic Society Organized.

It has been decided that on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Alumni association of the Catholic university, which will take place about June 14, the dedication of a beautiful memorial to her students who gave their lives for their country in the great war will take place. A large white marble tablet on which will be inscribed the names of the fifteen students who gave up their lives on the field of battle or in the hospitals will be dedicated. The tablet will rest on an elevated base and will be of Georgia marble. The site will be central, where all students pass and repass daily, including hundreds of priests and young ecclesiastics whose prayers will often be offered up for the heroes.

The following is a list of the names of dead: Walter C. Clementz, Edward James Crotty, Joseph Gerald English, Joseph J. Fenton, Sherman Green, Edward Lusian Killion, Edward Gerard McCarthy, Peter McGeady, Louis Maus, Francis J. Meaney, John Vincent Moore, Robert Gerard Mulcahy, Edward George Paschalis, James Simons Timothy and Francis Wolohan. It has further been decided to found a requiem mass to be sung each year about All Souls Day.

New Law School Dean.

Dr. Peter J. McLoughlin, vice dean of the law school of the university, has been appointed dean, succeeding the late Dean Thomas C. Carrigan.

A shadow was cast over the entire campus Tuesday noon, when J. A. "Kewpie" Farrell was struck in the forehead with a baseball bat and seriously injured. He was rushed to Georgetown University hospital, where he was placed under the care of Dr. Tully Vaughn, who performed two operations on the wound. Though it was announced that the injury was very grave, consisting of a fractured skull and concussion of the brain, the entire university now rejoices to know that he is on the road to recovery. The accident occurred while several of the students were having an impromptu ball game in front of Gibbons hall.

Rector's Prize Debate Plans.

Upon invitation from Immaculata seminary, the University Glee club gave a recital at the West End institution Monday evening, the last of this season. The welcome they received at the hands of the Sisters of Providence and the girls was recognition of the progress made in so short a time under the leadership of the director, Mr. Behrendt. Numerous solos marked the program of selected songs offered.

The annual rector's prize debate will be held in the assembly room of McMahon hall tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock. The topic is "Resolved: That all international debts growing out of the war should be canceled." The affirmative side will be upheld by Richard J. Smith, chairman; William J. Walsh, Oscar Winninghof, and Cuthbert J. Scott. Those on the negative side are James F. Hughes, chairman; William A. Smith, Victor S. Von Szelliski and Robert E. Reuss. The general public and the students of the various colleges and universities of the District are invited.

Senior Class Reception.

The senior class extended a reception to the rector and vice rector of the university Monday night in the reception room of Gibbons hall. The reception was in charge of the president of the class, William F. Kendrick, with Frank Burke acting as chairman of the evening. Harold de La Vergne, Frank Biberstein and Norman Roddy furnished musical entertainment. Bishop Shahan and Dr. Dougherty congratulated the senior class on their accomplishments and promised future success if the principles taught while in school were followed.

The rector made a plea that all graduates keep in touch with their alma mater. The principal address of the evening was made by Dr. Peter

Gullday, who spoke on moderation and purity of ideas and actions.

Dramatic Society Formed.

There has been at the university a long-felt need for a dramatic society. This need was not only felt by the students, but also by the faculty, and it was at the request of those participating in the recent production that they received the approval by the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Shahan, rector of the university, of the formation of such a society. The first meeting of the newly formed dramatic club was held last night in the reception room of Gibbons hall.

P. J. O'Connor was elected president; Claude Courand, vice president; John Fitzgerald, secretary, and William Hagan, treasurer. A constitution was framed and plans were made for the induction of new members. They are to be chosen by competitive dramatic tests.
